Gettysburg — Another day for Yankees to wallow in anti-South hate

This new moral high ground not only lifted his cause to victory but to this day continues to whitewash Northern motives in that war.

So, why does any of this matter? I mean, the South lost and slavery did end, which is a very good thing. Every second that slavery existed in America was an abomination.

Well, there is another important truism about history. Those who fail to understand it are doomed to repeat it.





CANNONS FOR FORT GERMANTOWN

Our parks are great! However, to be complete, Fort Germantown needs full size War Between the States cannons. A partnership between the City, the Robert E. Lee Camp Sons of Confederate Veterans, and a few citizens has been developed for this purpose.

The Lee Camp has secured for the City of Germantown two (2) surplus cannon carriages valued at over \$18,000 for reconditioning and painting. Two (2) cannon barrels are needed to complete the project. The camp is in contact with several sources regarding this project and will need to raise over \$10,000 to secure the barrels for placement on the carriages.

To date, the Lee Camp has received donations in excess of \$3,600 for the purchase of the cannon barrels. It is anticipated that with some citizen participation, the funds necessary to purchase the cannons can be raised by this fall. Tax deductible donations can be sent to the Robert E. Lee Camp at P.O. Notes from the Field

From a field surgeon with the 5th Virginia Infantry at the Battle of Sharpsburg

A strong, sturdy-looking Reb was coming laboriously on with a Yank of no small proportions perched on his shoulders. Wonderingly I joined the group surrounding and accompanying them at every step, and then I learned why all this especial demonstration; why the Union soldiers cheered and again cheered this Confederate soldier, not because of the fact alone that he had brought into the hospital a sorely wounded Federal soldier, who must have died from hemorrhage had he been left on the field, but from the fact, that was palpable at a glance, that the Confederate too was wounded. He was totally blind; a Yankee bullet had passed directly across and destroyed both eyes, and the light for him had gone out forever. But on he marched, with his brother in misery perched on his sturdy

shoulders. He would accept no assistance until his partner announced to him that they had reached their goal - the field hospital. It appears that they lay close together on the field, and after the roar of battle had been succeeded by that painfully intense silence that hangs over a hard-contested battlefield; where the issue is yet in doubt, and where a single rifle shot on the skirmish line falls on your ear like the crack of a thousand cannon. The groans of the wounded Yank reached the alert ears of his sightless Confederate neighbor, who called to him, asking him the nature and extent of his wounds. On learning the serious nature of them, he said: "Now, Yank, I can't see, or I'd get out of here mighty lively. Some darned Yank has shot away my eyes, but I feel as strong otherwise as ever. If you think you can get on my back and do the seeing, I will do the walking, and we'll sail into some hospital where we can both receive surgical treatment." This programme had been followed and with complete success.

We assisted the Yank to alight from his Rebel warhorse, and you can rest assured that loud and imperative call was made for the surgeons to give not only the Yank, but his noble Confederate partner, immediate and careful attention.



The coin itself is one troy ounce of .999 fine silver. It was minted in Washington State by the Northwest Territorial Mint (NWTM).

One side of the coin features the Great Seal of the Confederacy, showing Colonial George Washington astride his horse. The other side of the coin was designed in 2002. The scripture "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord" is from Psalm 33:12 and celebrates the strong Christain faith and tradition of the old South. The centerpiece is an eagle from a U.S. 1830s silver half-dollar, a coin in circulation during the war. The Breastplate or shield has the "Stars and Bars" of the battle flag with CSA (Confederate States of America) above.

Much history rests in this coin. It can be kept as a treasured keepsake or given as a gift.

The scheduled program was on Confederate flags used by the Troops and covered many flags and banners we were not familiar with but may have seen from time to time in prints and books. To say the topic was interesting is a gross understatement. We will need to have Bruce Lynch back to go into depth on just a couple of the flags so we can get the whole story.

GETTYSBURG was a Blast! (pun intended). I have never seen so many blue coats (targets) at one time. Bankhead's Battery fired about 150 rounds into the Blue line in five engagements while members of the 154th Bluff City Senior Regiment Infantry joined with other units and a member or two from Bankhead's Battery, Rick Lantz and Hilton Cohe, in the long grey line and put up a fierce roar of musketry fire and clouds of smoke. The event was just as good as the 125th even if I do move slower than I did 25 years ago.

VICKSBURG NATIONAL CONVENTION was held July 17th thru the 21st. It is reported as a good nonelection year event corresponding with the 150th event. Our Brigade will be hosting the 2016 convention with the Forrest Camp leading the charge since they have done this on several other occasions.

FORT GERMANTOWN CANNON PROJECT is on in a big way and close to being fully funded. The City has with the help of some Camp members David and Gage Owens (see photo) who picked up the iron carriages from Shiloh and delivered them to us. They are now at Southern Painting being sand blasted, repaired and painted. Our cost for all of this a will be less that 3,000 for both carriages that cost about 12,000 each! Contributions have been received in excess of 600. The other camps have pledged contributions to the Cannon Fund. Have YOU? The next step will be to order and pay for the reproduction barrels which will cost about

4,000 each. We have applications for grants pending with three organizations to help with the funding but we always want our members to have the opportunity, no matter how small, to contribute to the Cannon fund and feel the pride of ownership. YES, we do own the cannons. They will be on loan to the City of Germantown, but they are ours. See photo. The pending grants are with the Tennessee Wars Commission, the Tennessee Division SCV and the Order of the Southern Cross. It would be great to have 100% participation by our camp members in giving something regardless of size to this project that will give us continuous recognition in the public eyes in a very positive manner.

FORREST BOYHOOD HOME SIGNS PROJECT is for the purpose of adding interstate park like signs on the roads leading to the Home Site and to encourage travelers to visit the property. We need 900 more to complete this and full fund the project. Bring an extra 5 or 10 to the meeting and donate it to the cause or add any of these projects to your dues and remit them to the Camp.

FORREST BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION was on the 14th in Forrest Park in Memphis and it was a rousing success. Several hundred were in attendance and the Lee Camp was well represented by a number of our members as well as Mark Buchanan for the Citizens to Save Our Parks and Mike Daugherty with the Color Guard. The event should have shown the City that we take our history seriously and it does matter. If you have not registered with the Citizens to Save our Parks please go on line or see Mark and join there is no cost but contributions to the legal offense fund are greatly appreciated.
