Our August 27 meeting will be our annual business meeting. Although this is not an officer election year, we have several items to discuss and vote on, including a dues increase and bylaw changes. So, it is important to have as good a turnout as possible.

Keep recruiting, we are the last line of defense for our Confederate ancestors.

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PROPOSED CHANGES TO CAMP 33 BYLAWS

Explanation:

The change to Section 1 is in response to some members' questions about the timing o any dues changes. The changes to Section 2 are to make the Camp bylaws consistent with the National SCV dues bylaws.

ARTICLE V. Dues.

Section 1. The annual dues to the Camp shall be set and approved annually by the membership at the Annual Meeting. (ADD) *Changes to annual dues approved by the membership shall be effective with the next dues cycle.*

Section 2. Members in arrears (DELETE) *three (3) months* (ADD) *one (1) month* in payment of dues shall be classified as delinquent, and (DELETE) *four (4) months' arrearage* shall automatically impose suspension. Payment of all back dues within the current year, a payment of a \$5.00 reinstatement fee together with all additional levies for that year, shall permit reinstatement to active membership. A member delinquent one year or more shall be only reinstated upon (DELETE) *vote of the Camp and* payment of all amounts due from him to the Camp.

PROPOSED LOCAL DUES INCREASE

At our July meeting there was a discussion about raising the Camp 33 local dues. Our local dues have been \$5 annually for more than a decade. That amount per member will not even meet the current cost of producing and mailing the bimonthly newsletter. Our other primary source of income is fund raisers, which presently consists of only two turkey shoots. A recommendation was made to raise the annual dues to \$10 annually. This is still much less than some camps charge. The decision on this was postponed until the officers could consult the bylaws and discuss the matter. As it turns out the bylaws do not directly address the dues structure, leaving it to the membership to decide at the annual meeting. The officers voted unanimously at their August 10 meeting to bring the matter to a vote at the August 27 annual meeting.

'Them Hawkins Boys'



The Hawkins family first came into the Short Mountain area of Tennessee around 1808, after traveling from Virginia and a short stay in the wilderness of Kentucky near Fort Boonesborough. They were frontiersmen, long hunters, farmers, pioneers, and warriors. Life long Methodist, and obedient servants of God, they never hesitated to lay down the plow and ax to pick up their muskets and powder horns when the calling came.

My third great grandparents, John and Mary Tinney Hawkins had a land grant for a large section of Short Mountain (the actual mountain). John and his siblings had been born in the lush green hills of Virginia, Mary was born in Inishboffin, County Galway, Ireland. But all their children would be born on Short Mountain, including my great-great grandfather, Joseph Tinney Hawkins. He would marry the beautiful daughter of Enoch and Betsy Ferrell Jones, Eliza, in 1832. They started their own farm in the shadow of Short Mountain and had six daughters and four sons. Those four sons, "Them Hawkins Boys", had quite the reputation. Tall, strong, and rambunctious they were as close to one another as the morning fog to the mountain. Life was hard, to be expected, but life was grand and happiness was easily found once the chores were done. I'm sure they heard talk of the other southern states speaking of session. But they were isolated, rural farmers, and the corn crop and weight of the pigs would have been of far more concern to them then whispers of war.

But after first voting not to secede, Tennessee changed it's mind when Lincoln said he would invade the Southland. That did it. The family had carved a life out of the rough terrain and rocky soil, built their church, raised their children, lived, loved, laughed, cried, and buried their loved ones on that sacred ground. No one was going to come on their land with guns in hands and threaten them without one hell of a fight. Their ancestors had fought in the Indian Wars, the American Revolution, the War of 1812, and by God they would fight again to protect their loved ones, farms, and the State of Tennessee that they helped build.

My great grandfather, Joseph Irvin Hawkins, was only 14 years old when his three older brothers joined the 18th Tennessee Infantry, and left the only home they ever knew to go and fight the Northern aggressors. He hated they would not let him join because of his age, and I'm sure his daddy would not allow it. Too young, all his other sons were gone, and there was still a farm to tend. But Joseph T. Hawkins, at age 51, did his part, he joined the Warren County Confederate Home Guard, and ended up serving two tours - unheard of at the time. His brothers, Robert, Enoch James, and John D would train and fight for a year. Then, when their year long commitment was met, Robert and Enoch left the 18th (John stayed with the 18th throughout the War, gaining the rank of Third Corporal), went back home, got their now 15 going on 16-year-old little brother, and the three joined the 11th Tennessee Calvary. Enoch would be captured, sent to a Yankee prison, take the "oath" with his fingers crossed behind his back, get paroled, and head straight back to Short Mountain to ride with Pomp Kersey and his Guerrilla Band. Joseph and his big brother Robert would survive the war, returned home, and be buried up on Short Mountain. All the Hawkins men, "Them Hawkins Boys", my great grandfather's 1st cousins, a few uncles, and too many second and third cousins to count, fought for the Confederacy. Some died, many were severely wounded. But they all joined to fight, and they fought like hell. The next chapter will be about my Masey family's Confederate legacy. This is my family's story. This is my family's history. This is my Blood. And the Blood is Strong.


